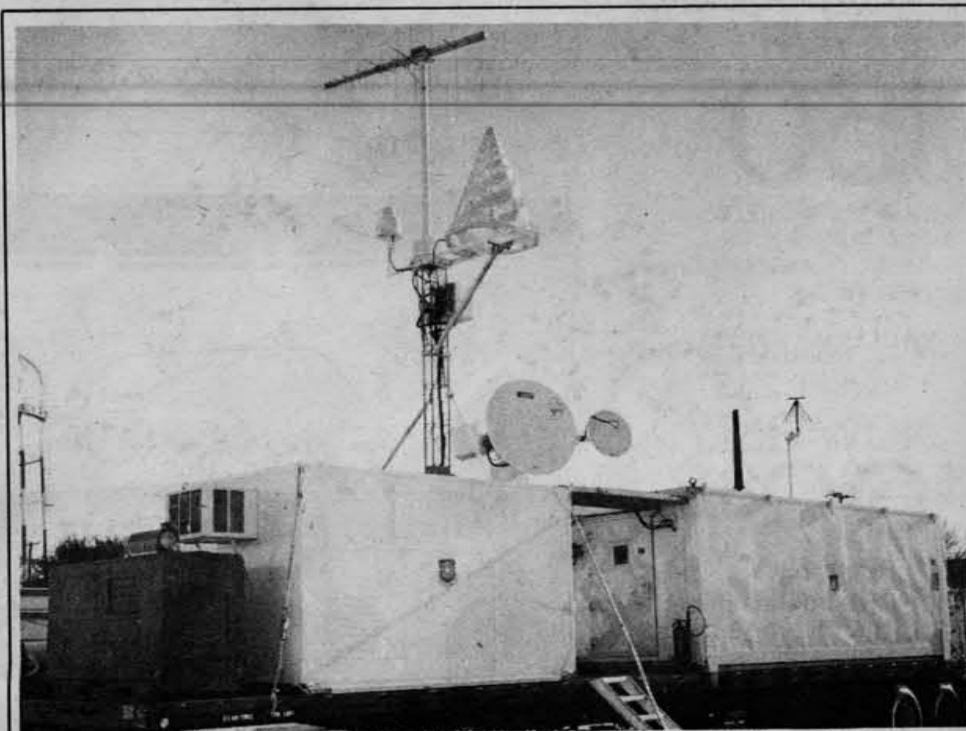
The featured speaker for the first alumni event will be Maj. Gen. Doyle E. Larson, ESC commander.

Flyerettes raise record to 28-5

The Kelly AFB Flyerettes continued its winning ways in women's basketball action, advancing its season record to 28-5 with wins over Randolph AFB, Olmos Pharmacy and Sheppard AFB.



Kelly won the first game over Randolph by a point, 62-61. The lead in the game changed hands several times, but Kelly pulled away to a seven point lead with a minute to go and held off a late Randolph rally.

Vanessa Coverson lead the attack with 22 points, 11 rebounds and four assists. Kim Long hit for 16 points, while Marilina Nieves had 12. Stacey Apodaca had eight points, five assists and three steals, while Terry Donovan had five rebounds. Maxine Braswell added six rebounds.

Kelly picked up a win in city-league play when Olmos Pharmacy failed to show up in time for the game. The Flyerettes skrimaged them and came out ahead 46-14 after 30 minutes. Lynne Chapman was back in the lineup after being out for two weeks with a leg injury, and scored eight points while pulling in ten rebounds. Arlene Jones also added seven rebounds and six points. The Flyerettes city-league record now stands at 5-2.

Kelly traveled to Sheppard AFB and came back with two wins in three games. Kelly took the first 61-58, with Chapman scoring 28 points. Game #2 was also a Kelly win, 55-45. Nieves paced the offense with 22 points. Kelly dropped the third game 61-54, despite the efforts of Coverson with 23 points and Apodaca with 11.

The Flyerettes next game is scheduled for the San Fernando Gym on Travis St. at 8 p.m. Wednesday. They will play the Ft. Sam Rangerettes.

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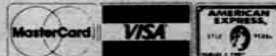
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MOTES-R demonstration a success

The Electronic Warfare Field Operations Test and Measurement Branch conducted a demonstration of the Mobile Test and Exercise System for Radar (MOTES-R) and the Identification Friend or Foe Target Tracking subsystem recently.

The purpose of the demonstration was to exhibit the capabilities of the new test and measurement system. Each directorate of AFEWC and ESC was invited to receive a briefing on operational aspects of the MOTES-R/IFF Tracker system. Dean Coleman, Dave Brown and A1C Don Stough presented the various briefings.

The week long demonstration drew more than 150 people. They learned that the MOTES-R is an automated multiple receiver system designed to provide measurement capability for evaluating the operational performance of ground based and airborne electronic warfare equipment during electronic warfare test and training exercises. MOTES-R

consists of antennas, receivers, computers, signal processors, display/storage units and support equipment. Procedures are automated through computer software to intercept, measure and analyze multiple radar threat emissions and their airborne countermeasure response.

The IFF Tracking subsystem, deployed with the MOTES-R, functions to track aircraft of interest in azimuth, elevation and range, and provide this information to the MOTES-R central computer unit. The CCU uses the information to direct the directional antennas to the same point.

The MOTES-R system was designed to operate in remote locations using internal power generation. MOTES-R requires a five man crew for set up and operation.

Recently, MOTES-R was deployed to Douglas, Wyo., to support the Strategic Air Command exercise GIANT VOICE, the annual bomb/navigation competition. During the deployment, it provided detailed analysis of B-52 and FB-111 electronic countermeasures systems for use in scoring competition aircraft.

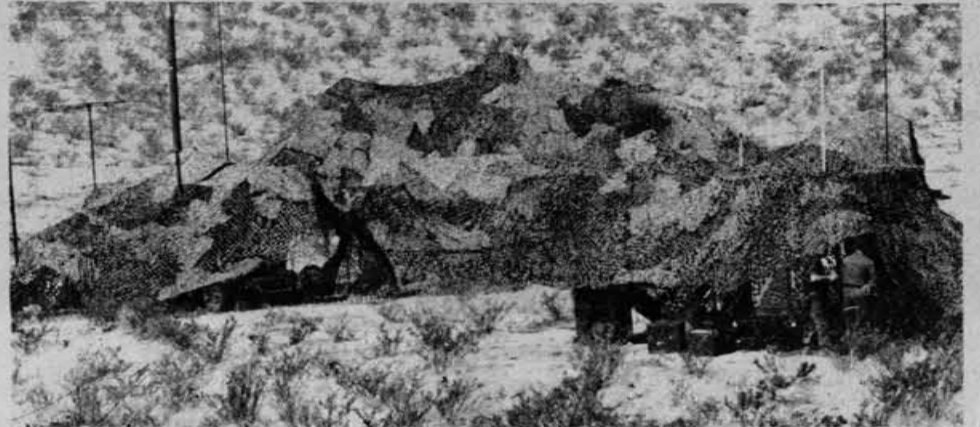
ESC members ready for Gallant Knight deployment

More than 100 Electronic Security Command members will be traveling to Ft. Bragg, N.C., to join other airmen, sailors and Marines participating in the U.S. Readiness Command's Gallant Knight 82, a Rapid Deployment Joint Task Force exercise.

ESC units departing San Antonio will include contingents of the 6948th ESS, the 6960th ESW, AFEWC and Headquarters ESC. Other ESC elements at Gallant Knight will include detachments of the 6940th ESW at Ft.

George G. Meade, MD; 6949th ESS at Offutt AFB, Neb.; and EST, Langley AFB, Va.

Directed by Col. Charles McBride, 6960th ESW vice-commander, ESC units will provide secure communications as well as electronic warfare support - involving the use of high-technology equipment to disrupt or manipulate an enemy's electronic means of controlling and coordinating his forces.
